Dear Trinitarians

On the way into school today one of the new year 7 pupils said to me 'I love coming into school as I am learning so many new facts every day'. This really did brighten my day. Earlier in the week, whilst on lunch duty I made a note of another pupil's comment 'I hope I get to be a House Captain as I am going to change the world'. This made me feel proud, that our Trinitarians are dreaming big and wanting to make a huge difference. Yes, yes, yes – we can change the world and make a huge impact. We had 47 pupils apply for the 4 House Captain posts across the secondary phase. Their applications were inspirational, making our job really difficult picking only 4. The interviews started last week and continue into this week. At Trinity we have many leadership opportunities such as the Year 7 Buddy scheme, the Family Trinity Voice Representatives scheme, House Captains, Mental Health Ambassadors and our Pupil Leadership Team comprising of Head Boy and Girl, Deputies and Prefects. Interviews for our new Head boy and Head girl position will commence next week. We encourage all our pupils to live life in all its fullness and have a go at developing their amazing leadership skills.

Trinity Secondary held several very successful events last week. There was the 'Welcome to Year 7 Parent Meet and Greet the Tutors' event live on Zoom that was very informative giving advice and guidance on how you can support your son / daughter at home with their homework. (Please do check out our short videos on our website designed to support and help you understand our Knowledge Organisers and their importance). We also recently held a 'Year 6 Admissions /Transfer to Secondary' event via Zoom. Coming shortly we plan to hold a Year 11 Parent Evening on 'Zoom' - giving clear information about applying for Post 16 and how to cope with public exams. We will continue to work hard planning other parent events, including formal parent's evenings, all of which will be structured to happen remotely whilst ensuring they are as informative as if we were all present in person.

Can I remind families to talk to your sons / daughters to reinforce the national expectations during COVID whilst on their way to and from school? Year 9, 10 and 11 have been amazing at wearing face coverings in school whilst in their social spaces. However we have had some members of the community ask us to remind our pupils aged 11 or over to wear face coverings when entering local shops. Some are forgetting to put these coverings on when they go into Sainsbury's and some of the smaller corner shops. We do remind them of this within school, but the more times we all mention it, the better it is for our extended community. The rule of 6 is also key, and pupils once they leave school need to keep in groups of no more than 6. These are national expectations that we all need to keep to.

Pupils are now fully back into the swing of learning. It has been great seeing around 1000 praise post cards / texts / house points awarded over the last week. This is terrific and shows how amazing our pupils have adapted to life at school. Please do thank your children for their amazing behaviour and attitude to learning. I would also like to thank you – they would not have settled so quickly if it had not been for all the great support and preparation you do at home. Thank you and have a great weekend.

Trinity voice are currently looking at Black History Month and we have many planned activities that you will see over the coming few weeks. Watch this space.

Our first will be on Ignatius Sancho, taken from our Year One curriculum, who was the first black Briton to have voted – and lived in the borough of Lewisham.

All of our Wednesday worships, led by myself or Mr Weddell, will include an inspirational black figure who represents our focus characteristic for this half term: principled. I look forward to filming our first one next week for the pupils. Every Thursday of this month, we are inviting family members to speak to our pupils through a zoom meeting about their experiences and achievements. 

FACE COVERINGS – LET'S KEEP SAFE





Guidance on use of face covering when travelling to school or college

Children aged 11 and over are legally required to <u>wear a face</u> <u>covering on public transport in England</u>, unless exempt for health, age or disability reasons.

In accordance with advice from Public Health England, we recommend that local authorities advise children and young people aged 11 and over to wear a face covering when travelling on dedicated school transport, unless they are exempt. Coronavirus (COVID-19) usually spreads by droplets from coughs, sneezes and speaking. When used correctly, wearing a face covering may reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) droplets in certain circumstances, helping to protect others.

Schools should support local authorities in promoting the use of face coverings when travelling to and from school, and help them to resolve any issues of non-compliance where appropriate.

The 'Hands. Face. Space.' campaign urges everyone to continue to wash their hands, cover their face and make space to control infection rates. The NHS has released a 'Hands. Face. Space.' video that may be a useful resource when communicating the importance of wearing a face covering on transport directly to children and young people.







National Portrait Gallery

HOLD STILL

A Portrait of our Nation in 2020

Spearheaded by The Duchess of Cambridge, Patron of the National Portrait Gallery, Hold Still was an ambitious community project which was launched in May 2020 to create a unique collective portrait of the UK during lockdown. People of all ages were invited to submit a photographic portrait, taken in a six-week period during May and June, focussed on three core themes – Helpers and Heroes, Your New Normal and Acts of Kindness. Over 31,000 submissions were received from across the country, with entrants ranging from 4 to 75 years old. From these, a panel of judges selected 100 portraits, assessing the images on the emotions and experiences they conveyed.













The final 100 portraits can now be viewed in a special digital exhibition recording this extraordinary period in our history. From virtual birthday parties, handmade rainbows and community clapping to brave NHS staff, resilient keyworkers and people dealing with illness, isolation and loss. These images convey humour, grief, creativity, kindness, tragedy and hope, expressing and exploring both our shared and individual experiences.

Discover star specimens such as Hope – a 25-metre blue whale plunging down from the ceiling, a rock as old as the solar system and one of the UK's most complete dinosaurs. Other treasures from the Museum's unique collection of more than 80 million specimens can be seen across its many permanent galleries, which includes one of the world's most impressive dinosaur exhibitions. The Museum also has a dynamic programme of temporary exhibitions including its world-renowned Wildlife Photographer of the Year exhibition.

There is also has a range of exciting and educational activities online to occupy yourself and family at home, in your garden or local outdoor space including how to make a volcano, a T Rex origami dinosaur, a moth headdress or dinosaur footprint cookies.

Unearth the mystery of the Havering Hoard, the largest ever Bronze Age hoard to be discovered in London in a new free major exhibition at the Museum of London Docklands. Weapons including axe heads, spearheads, fragments of swords, daggers and knives, alongside some other unusual objects rarely found in the UK, make up a total of 453 bronze objects dating between c.900 and c.800 BC. This intriguing discovery raises numerous questions about not just the objects themselves but about the people who buried them. Entry is free with a pre-booked general admission ticket to the museum.

Trinity Mental Health & Wellbeing



Shelley Simpson

Attendance, Welfare and Deputy Safeguarding Officer

Miss Simpson is the Attendance and Welfare Officer for Trinity all through School, the Deputy Safeguarding Officer and also responsible for children that are cared for.

Her role is to support pupils to attend school regularly, to support them in being happy and safe in school and are not suffering any harm in or outside of school. Miss Simpson works with the local authority, Children's Social Care and the Virtual School to make this possible.

If a pupil is having problems with their school attendance it is her duty to inform the local authority of this and work together with parents and pupils to find ways to ensure their attendance does not fall so low that they become a Persistent Absentee which will stay on their record for their whole time at Trinity. Part of her role involves going in to the local community to undertake home welfare visits to see why a pupil is not attending.

Trinity School takes the safeguarding of pupils seriously and have a duty of care to ensure pupils are safe in and out of school. Miss Simpson works closely with Children's Social Care to find the right solutions and support for pupils and their family.

Miss Simpson is also a Mental Health First Aider for the school and works alongside our Trinity School Counsellor supporting pupils where needed.
