








CHAPLAIN'S CORNER By Miss S Alder



This week we have continued to focus on the word Courage and about continuing to do what you would normally do even when faced with extraordinary situations. Many Christians believe that God asks us to offer our skills, talents and abilities in the face of adversity, and that he will use that courageousness to achieve great things.

In the secondary whole school worship we focused on Jesus Walking on the Water (Matthew 14: 22-34) and how Peter was able to walk on water until he stopped trusting Jesus and became afraid. We reflected on how it is easy to forget that God is always with us and we become frightened by the situation we are in and about remembering when we see or hear things that scare us, we need to remember to pray and to trust God.

In our first live primary zoom worships we discussed our fears and we reflected on what we might be afraid of and how can be courageous in those scary circumstances. Top Tips for Remote Learning

Get dressed: We know that there is nothing better than a pyjama day. However, it is really important to get dressed and start the day as you mean to go on, so avoid the temptation to study in your PJs. Get up, have breakfast and feel motivated for the day ahead. Otherwise you might find yourself in the mood for lounging on the sofa all day!





Create a workspace: If you are able to do so, set up a designated study area so that you can keep your studying away from your home life. If you're lucky enough to have a desk, make use of this space but if not, any surface where you can sit comfortably is good enough. Try and keep your work space tidy and organised.

Establish a routine: We know some of you are morning people, and others less so, but it's important to establish a routine. Stick to your timetable, it helps to plan your day and is a great way to keep on of your work and not get distracted during your study hours. Remember, it's important to stretch your legs and get some exercise during break times.





Avoid any distractions: Turn off your phone or your social media notifications if you are easily distracted. — Whatever it takes to help you stay focused while working. We know that this isn't always easy in our connected world, but use your study time wisely.

Don't be afraid to ask for help: Remember, we are here for you during this uncertain time. If you have a question about your work, please do get in touch with your teacher – they are just a quick email away waiting to help, so please get in touch. Remember, we're all in this together!



Ensuring outstanding behaviour and safeguarding children during online learning

At Trinity, the safety and wellbeing of our pupils is our most important priority. During this time of online learning we have set up clear expectations of how we expect our pupils to behave during online lessons and also how to keep themselves safe. Our protocols are as follows:

Behaviour for learning expectations

- Pupils must be punctual to their lessons (following their normal school timetable)
- Pupils must attend family group time
- Pupils should try to find a quiet space to work with no distractions
- When entering their class lesson, pupils must mute their audio
- If this is available, pupils must have their screen on
- Pupils must participate in the normal class attendance register
- When required, pupils need to unmute and converse with their teacher and peers
- Pupils need to have the necessary equipment as required by their teacher
- Pupils should only use the chat facility in Teams to discuss the work or any technical issues they may be facing
- Pupils should remain in the lesson until a teacher tells them they can leave
- Pupils need to submit work as directed by their teacher. They can contact their teacher via Teams or Weduc if they are having any problems submitting work
- If a pupil wishes to discuss something with their teacher which they consider more private then they should use Weduc not Teams as the Teams chat is open to the whole group

Online safety

- When online, pupils should blur their background or have a Teams background
- All lessons are delivered using Teams so pupils should only be accessing this during the day
- The only way a pupil should contact school is via Teams or Weduc
- If anyone external tries to contact pupils online, they should tell their family immediately
- Parents, if possible, please check in with your child regularly during the day
- It is good for pupils to switch off from technology in the evenings, and especially at least an hour before bedtime
- Pupils need to take breaks away from IT, do regular exercise, stay hydrated, eat healthily



The scoop of the day Why did Emit Till die?

On August 28, 1955 a 14 year old Black-American because he was allegedly for wolf-whistling. In August 1955 the young man went to Mississippi to visit his relatives on holiday. He went to go meat his cousins, one of them dared him to go into Roy Bryant's shop and talk to Carolyn, Roy's wife. When Roy Byrant returned from his trip and had heard about the situation, the next night he and his half-brother went to Till's uncle's house, hauled Till into the truck and drove off. They beat Emmet, shot him and threw him into the river with a heavy weight attached to his neck with barbed wire. It took the police three days to find the body. Murders of black Americans were almost 'normal' Mississippi.

The defendants later sold their story (admitting to murder) to a magazine for \$3500 which fueled further outrage. Emmett Till did not get justice. Black Americans were still murdered in Mississippi and their murderers still went free.

However, the Till case is significant in the history of civil rights (the movement towards equality for black people). Civil rights campaigners used publicity to make it hard for people to ignore outrages and injustice. The NAACP (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, a group defending the rights of black people) produced a pamphlet called M is for Mississippi and Murder, linking the cases of Till, Lee and Smith, all black and all murdered in Mississippi in 1955.

Year 8 have been learning about the civil rights movement and this week were looking at the murder of Emmett Till.
