Dear Trinitarians

We have had an extremely successful week planning and preparing for pupils to return to our building fully whilst still delivering quality home learning. We are excited for Monday and cannot wait to see our buildings filled with pupils - they are not the same when they are quiet. A reminder that all pupils within the primary phase will return on Monday. Please make sure that you keep socially distanced when you drop off as well as when you pick up - and please do not forget your masks. The secondary phase have a staggered return and Year group letters have been posted that you should have received. In the secondary phase we will be carrying out the Lateral Flow Test for all those with consent, which is over 90% of the school population. You will find in this pack that all families can now order the home tests and you can pick them up to carry out at home (the school cannot provide them - do follow the guidance given). After the Secondary Phase carries out the tests in school, for the stock we have, we will then be giving those with consent a pack to take home for you as families to continue the routine. More detail will follow on this. On Monday the 8th the secondary phase are welcoming back Year 11 only, then on the Tuesday we have Year 11 and Year 7 etc. You will be sent a further text the day before your son / daughters return reminding you of the time they need to arrive for the first day.

Monday 8th March is an exciting day for our return to school but also as it is International Women's Day. Women around the world have been gathering to celebrate and campaign for women's rights and celebrate their achievements on International Women's Day since 1911.

The campaign theme for this Year is 'Choose to Challenge'. A challenged world is an alert world and from challenge comes change. So let's all #ChooseToChallenge.


A reminder that pupils should come to school in uniform and that primary aged pupils are not to wear masks. This is in line with government guidance.


The club will re-open on the 8th of March for year Groups R, 1, 2, and 3.

LEWISHAM SAFER STREETS UPDATE ON LB LEWISHAM'S COVID-19 TRANSPORT RESPONSE

Lewisham and Lee Green Low Traffic Neighbourhood: safer journeys to school

Residents in and around the Lewisham and Lee Green Low Traffic Neighbourhood (LTN) will be asked for their <u>feedback on proposals</u> aimed at making children's journeys to and from school safer and healthier.

Proposals to limit traffic around schools at certain times of the day were originally announced in November. The proposals will see a number of streets around schools temporarily closed during pick-up and drop-off times.

School Streets have successfully been rolled out at schools across the borough to help parents and children to maintain social distancing at the school gates, as well as help address air quality and promote active travel. In line with current Department for Transport guidance, we will be consulting with residents to find out how they feel about these new measures. If the proposals go ahead, they will be introduced in early May.

The schools included in the proposals are:


- St Winifred's RC School
- Trinity CofE Secondary School
- Trinity CofE Primary School
- Brindishe Lee School
- · Brindishe Manor School
- St Saviours RC School

Residents will be invited to feedback on the wider LTN in late May. The Council had previously planned to consult in March, but after careful consideration, the date has been moved to allow for consultation on the schools proposals to take place first.

This will allow us to get an accurate picture of how residents feel about all of the changes in the area. We will continue to monitor traffic in the area and will share this data as part of the broader LTN consultation in May. For a printed version of the survey please call 020 314 3990.

Asymptomatic testing information for parents and adults in households with children at school or college

NHS Test and Trace announced earlier this week, that all adults in households with school and college age children without symptoms can now access regular rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing.


Test kits can either be collected or ordered online, as set out below. Schools cannot give test kits to parents, carers or household members and cannot order more test kits for this purpose. Trinity pupils will continue to access testing through us though.

Undertaking regular, rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing helps reduce transmission of the virus. Parents and other adults in households with children at school or college, who do not have symptoms, can now access regular, rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing. This includes childcare and support bubbles.

Tests are fast, easy and completely free. There are <u>different ways</u> for a household, childcare or support bubble to collect their test to take at home, twice-weekly:

- through your employer, if they offer testing to employees
- by collecting a home test kit from a local test site anyone aged 18 or over can collect
 2 packs of 7 tests
- by ordering a home test kit online please do not order online if you can access testing through other routes, this frees up home delivery for those who need it most

If you have any queries about the tests, and you live in England, please call 119 (free from mobiles and landlines). Lines are open every day from 7am to 11pm.

Info from TfL- Helping students, parents/carers and staff plan safe, sustainable journeys to and from school this spring

As all children and young people will now return to their classrooms for the spring term, as part of the Government's roadmap for leaving lockdown, we remain committed to doing our part to help them travel to school and college safely on our network.

School services

From 8 March we are planning to run bus services in a similar way to how they did during the autumn term. This means:

- Extra services on some routes, with some adjustments to services that ran last year to reflect demand
- Up to half of buses on certain higherfrequency routes signed as 'school services' (generally between 07:30 and 09:00 and 14:30 and 16:30)
- A full service on our existing school-dayonly routes (routes generally numbered 600-699)

These arrangements are planned to be in place until at least the end of the current term. We will confirm arrangements for after Easter in due course.

Schoolchildren travelling without adults should travel on the school services where possible, to help provide space for other customers on regular services. Customers who are not schoolchildren but who need to travel at school travel times (including school staff) are strongly encouraged to use regular services.

We are continually reviewing how our network is operating to ensure our approach is working and meeting demand as best as possible. Please check our dedicated webpage regularly for the latest information on school travel.

Safe travel across the public transport network

We are continuing to take a range of measures to ensure that the public transport network is clean and safe – including our enhanced cleaning regime. We ask everyone travelling to continue following our safer travel guidance to protect themselves and others. It is compulsory for everyone aged 11 and over to wear a face covering over their nose and mouth throughout any public transport journey unless exempt. Bus windows should remain open to ensure a good supply of fresh air, even in cold weather.

If a child aged 11 to 17 isn't wearing a face covering without an exemption or reasonable explanation, our officers may arrange for a warning letter to be sent to their parent or guardian. Further non-compliance could lead to the suspension of their concessionary travel.

Women in Science

Celebrate Women's History Month with the Science Museum. Women have long played an important but often unacknowledged role in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. Until the mid-1800s, women faced the same restraints and limitations in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics that they faced in their everyday life: lack of autonomy, support, recognition, and lack of educational opportunities.

Nonetheless, women carved diverse collaborative roles in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics from the mid-1800s onwards. Learn more about engaging and inspiring examples of women's early participation in these innovative fields in the Science Museum collections—from Ada Lovelace in the 1840s through to Beatrice Shilling's work in aviation during the Second World War and after.

Why study geography- Royal Geographical Society

On Monday 1st March 47 year 8 pupils attended a virtual "Geography Futures" workshop delivered by degree, post graduate degree and professional geographers. Normally we would have enjoyed a trip into Kensington's museum district to visit the historic and fascinating RGS site but this year the conference was delivered virtually.

The first speaker was Eve from the University of Sheffield. Pupils were asked to consider how geography is all around us and impacts on everyone.



the packaging and consumption of products. They also consider the morals and ethics involved in the factory conditions involved in some of product production and even the zero hour contracts given to delivery drivers.




Pupils then heard from Sofia a second year Kings University geography student. Pupils studied urbanisation and the impact it would have on their lives in London.



The slide opposite shows three of hundreds of exciting and dynamic jobs linked to geography. Town planning and sustainability consultants will

play an increasingly important role in our urban areas as we adapt to new ways of working and responses to climate change. From our discussions it transpires than many our pupils aspire to be architects and planners; sustainability has to be at the core of their vision and career.



BedZed in Croydon is a sustainable building developed that

inspired our pupils to think of solutions to urban problems such

as rising house prices, congestion, air pollution and even



Our third presenter was a civil servant who specialises in geomorphology. Pupils learnt that the civil service is a very large and diverse employer that highly values geography and the skills that geographers start their careers with.



Pupils learnt that the civil service has 23 ministries but employs thousands of people from a local to national level in a vast array of jobs from "the place naming department" at the Minister of Defense to hydrologists, environmental engineers to international diplomats. Geography is so important to the government that there is even a dedicated department to geography, geographers and geographical careers.

The last presenter of the session was Jamie a postgraduate physical geographer from the University of Belfast. The focus was on coastal management and climate change. Freddy, David, Gemma, Obi and India identified how human activity has altered our physical landscape and how climate change will impact on that change.

Year 8 represented the Trinity values perfectly and received much praise from the Royal Geographical Society. Jamie stated the following, "It was a pleasure to talk to Year 8 today, I was really impressed by their knowledge, eagerness and their engagement across all of the talks. They are a credit to yourself and Trinity." Well done year 8!




Dear Trinity Family,


