Dear Trinitarians

We have had an amazing week. Our Terrific Trinitarians have been living life to the full and taking up every opportunity possible. It has been children's mental health week and the theme for this year is bravery. Bravery comes in all shapes and sizes. Everyday bravery is something we all need throughout our lives. It's good for our mental health to try something new, push outside our comfort zone and to share worries and ask for help. Being brave makes you feel proud, feel good about yourself, feel more confident and feel stronger. It is brave to ask for help. We encourage pupils if they have worries or are unsure about something to always to ask to someone. Pupils can talk to their class teacher / family group leader or any member of staff. We also have trained Mental Health First Aiders across both sites to support pupils at all times. Please do talk to your children at home to help them find their inner brave.

We are supporting LGBT+ History month which is an informative and celebratory month, educating out prejudice and making LGBT+ people visible in all their rich diversity. The first celebration in the UK took place in 2005 and occurs in February in the wake of the abolition of Section 28, which was the clause that prevented any organisation, including schools, from discussing homosexuality. The clause was eventually replaced with a single equality act. The Church of England has published a clear document titled 'Valuing All God's children' which explicitly states that people are made in the image of God, all of us, without exception. Church of England schools have at their heart a belief that all children are loved by God, are individually unique and that the school has a mission to help each pupil to fulfil their potential in all aspects of their personhood: physically, academically, socially, morally and spiritually. Our aim is that all may flourish and have an abundant life. Trinity has a duty therefore to try to remove any factor that might represent a hindrance to a child's fulfilment. We want all pupils to willingly engage in learning in a safe and welcoming environment. Homophobic, biophobic and transphobic bullying, alongside all forms of bullying, is a factor that can inhibit a pupil's ability to feel safe. Trinity will not accept any forms of bullying.

This week we have had parents evening for all those in the primary phase. Next Wednesday we have year 10 parents evening as well, giving clear instruction on what the pupils need to do to succeed in the year 10 exams coming up very soon. We have also had trips out visiting universities and bowling. We have continued our Holocaust Memorial education with specific workshops for the pupils, as well as visits to many different cultural places of interest. The primary have been raising money for a net over their football cage - which did see Miss K and Mr Janes dive all over the place in an attempt to stop the goals being scored in the penalty shootout.

Look forward to another exciting week at Trinity. Please have a restful weekend.





ALL PARENTS - update on Corona Virus

Tuesday 4 February 2020

Dear all

Further to my email last week about Wuhan novel coronavirus, I wanted to give an update.

Current advice from the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) is for people, who fit in either category below, to self-isolate at home.

- Returned to the UK from Wuhan or Hubei Province in the last 14 days, or
- Returned to the UK from anywhere in China (not including Macao or Hong Kong) in the last 14 days and have developed symptoms of cough, fever or shortness
 of breath.

'Self-isolate at home' includes not coming to work, as well as avoiding public places. You'll also need to call NHS 111 to inform them of your recent travel, as well as contact your line manager.

Preventing the spread of infection

While there remain no confirmed Wuhan novel coronavirus cases at GOSH, we are monitoring the situation closely and staying up to date with the latest guidance issued by the DHSC, including this recently published guide on how to prevent the spread of infection.

To keep our patients safe, it is important we ask all patients who are attending the hospital the standard infection control screening questions:

- Have you experienced any sickness and diarrhoea over the past two days?
- Do you have any symptoms of respiratory illness such as cough, cold or fever? (If they answer 'yes', ask if they have returned from China, excluding Hong Kong and Macao, in the last 14 days).
- Have you been in contact with chickenpox over the past three weeks (and not had chickenpox before)?

Trinitarians compete in National Science Competition

On Wednesday 15th January, Dhanush Kesavan and Samuel Amadi from year 10 travelled to the Medway campus of the University of Greenwich to compete in the Finals of the South of England Science and Technology Challenge.

The challenge was to programme a robot to navigate a maze using sensors to detect obstacles and painted lines representing walls of the maze. As an additional challenge, the robot had to make a sound when it reached a specific point in the maze. Prizes for the best performing robots and presentation were awarded by the Vice Lord Lieutenant of Kent, Robert Oldfield OBE DL.



Working as a team with students from Woodbridge High School, Samuel and Dhanush diligently applied their knowledge of computer science, logic and angles to get the robot to follow instructions in the correct order. They demonstrated their resilience in their trial and error approach to ensuring the robot did what it should at the right time and their insight into how artificial intelligence is currently used compared to how it could be applied in the future.



Unfortunately, despite their efforts and giving the best presentation, there was a malfunction in the robot that prevented it completing the maze. Samuel and Dhanush weren't in the winning team, but they represented the Trinity community with integrity and deserve a round of applause for their efforts. We are very proud of them!
