Dear Trinitarians

Armistice Day is this Monday, 11 November. This marks the day World War One ended, at 11am on the 11th day of the 11th month, in 1918. A two minute silence is held to remember the people who have died in war / conflict from around the world. We will be doing this across Trinity as a sign of respect. As a school we have had all our family groups and classes looking at our own stories, those from the school which has been in place from before the war and our location within Lee and Hither Green. Using local information and our own thoughts our pupils have written prayers within the poppies and these will be displayed across both sites. We are also selling poppies in both sites, so pupils can access these - all we ask for is a donation which will go to the Royal British Legion fund.

We have had a very busy week with lots of active learning and events. Our year 7 parents were invited in for a welcome event of wine and cheese and were able to interact with many stalls and meet other parents across the year. This included finding out about our Black History Month projects, our support and inclusion programmes, our academically able programme, our knowledge organiser and how our App can further support our parents. Alongside these stalls we had a table highlighting what our Chaplaincy Team does and how our distinctive Trinity Charter develops each individual pupil holistically. Parents were also able to talk to the SEND team, PAFT and to the Heads of Year and the Senior team about the running of the school. The feedback was extremely positive a huge thank you to the staff for organising the event and for all those that came along.

Alongside this we had a week of Pre Public Exams for year 11, Year 5 went to the Science Museum to learn more about Space, a year 4 workshop on Romans and our pupils explored local habitats and measured the perimeter of objects all over the school site. Next week we have workshops for year 10 on Public safety, online safety talks, a visit across both sites by our Director of Education from Southwark Diocese and the much anticipated PAFT parents quiz night.

I wish to remind parents that this Wednesday (13th November) at 0900 we have the Parent Forum on uniform, which will start up our 2 weeks discussions on uniform across both sites. This will take place in the lower hall in the Primary site – please come and joint us as soon as you have dropped your son / daughter off. We are looking at both what we like about the uniform and what the ideas are about changing it. We would like as many people to respond as possible. All responses will be tabulated and presented to the governors who will make a decision about moving forward. We have generated an A4 sheet for ideas to be expressed and these will be discussed in groups on the Wednesday slot mentioned above as well as everyone having the opportunity of commenting and sending in their response. A copy of this form is within this pack and can be found at reception at both buildings from Wednesday morning onwards. The deadline for all returns is Wednesday 27th November 0900.

New Relationship, Sex and Health Education Curriculum

From September 2020 it will become compulsory for all schools to deliver a new statutory Relationship, Sex and Health Education curriculum. Schools must provide age appropriate lessons that will enable pupils to make informed decisions about their wellbeing, health and relationships and to build their self-efficacy in making decisions about risks, challenges and complex situations. It is a safeguarding curriculum that builds pupils' resilience, skills and confidence to access support when needed. Stop norovirus spreading this winter

Norovirus, sometimes known as the 'winter vorniting bug', is the most common stomach bug in the UK, affecting people of all ages. It is highly contagious and is transmitted by contact with contaminated surfaces, an infected person, or consumption of contaminated food or water.

The symptoms of norovirus are very distinctive – people often report a sudden onset of nausea followed by projectile vomiting and watery diarrhoea.



Good hand hygiene is important to stop the spread of the virus.

People are advised to:

- Wash their hands thoroughly using soap and water and drying them after using the toilet, before preparing food and eating
- . Not rely on alcohol gels as these do not kill the virus

An infection with norovirus is self-limiting and most people will make a full recovery in 1-2 days. It is important to keep hydrated – especially children and the elderly.

Do not visit either A&E or GPs with symptoms as this may spread the virus.


Chaplaincy drop in lunch sessions:

Remembrance Sunday




The challenge involves teams maintaining two portfolios of chosen shares, using information provided online to forecast trends, identify attractive shares and judges when to buy and sell to make a profit.
