## **Dear Trinitarians**

I hope you have had a fantastic week. It is a shame the sun has not been out, but we can definitely look forward to that next week. The forecast is looking wonderful. It has been amazing seeing pupils in all classrooms across the primary phase. Their smiles have continually lifted the spirits of all our staff. The Key Worker Provision has continued to have a high demand and we have around 85% of all year 10 pupils coming in for face to face learning as well. Monday starts our last week of this academic year. We will have the full provision for year 10 all week, including Friday. On Friday 17<sup>th</sup> July the Key Worker Provision will finish at 1300. The primary will close at 13h40.

We have been planning all week ready for September. I will give you some detail below, but we will be sending year group specific information out in a pack to all families before the end of term. The government expectations are that all pupils in all year groups return to school full-time from the beginning of the autumn term. We therefore expect all pupils to return to Trinity in September in full uniform. We will also expect you to make sure you do not send into school your children if they have any COVID 19 symptoms. If you or any member of your family have any of the symptoms you must get tested. The following points are noteworthy here to help you prepare for the September start:

- All of our pupils will be staying within year group bubbles across both sites. This means the pupils will be with their year group the whole time and should not cross into another bubble for their time within the school building.
- We have sorted out a soft start at the primary, which gives a window of when pupils can be dropped off at the gates in the morning. They will go straight to their class from the gate. In the secondary we will be having each year group having a different start time from a different entrance. We will be using the gate in Manor House Gardens as well as the main entrance. It is extremely important that pupils arrive within the window they have been given, to prevent cross over between groups. Parents will not be allowed on site for drop off, and will only be allowed on the primary site in the correct pick up zone at the end of the day. Other than this parents will need to make an appointment to come and talk to staff. This is to keep the whole school community safe.
- We will make sure all pupils get the full breadth and depth of the Trinity Curriculum, including all subjects. We may not be able to do some practical lessons to start with, but as soon as we can we will.
- A lunch service will be provided for all pupils.

- Pupils will still be expected to bring their own water bottles to school. In the primary these can be filled up in classrooms – but in the secondary re-filling will be difficult to start with.
- The end of the day will be different for different year groups as well, the secondary pupils will arrive and leave from the same gate.
- Pupils in the secondary will be expected to bring their own equipment. They will need their own pencil case, pencil, several black pens, ruler, rubber, sharpener and a glue stick.
- We will be making sure pupils use the hand sanitizers every time they come into the building and every time they go into a classroom. We will also have a clear cleaning programme across the school to maintain all areas that are used by more than one bubble throughout the day as well as a deep clean before the next day begins.

I appreciate this is a lot of information that is generic, but you will get further specific detail in a letter that will come out in the post. I would also like to suggest that you consider your mode of transport to school as well. It is highly recommended, where possible, that people either walk or cycle. We have a place for bikes at both sites. Public transport should only be used as a last resort, and pupils must wear face masks whilst on busses and trains. Getting dropped off is fine, but please be aware that the local road layouts have changed so please plan this into your schedule. For both buildings you have a window for arrival and to prevent mixing between groups it is vital that pupils arrive within their time slot.

We are very excited about the September start and hope you are also looking forward to this time in the future. To help our year 6 prepare for transition we have invited them all to our secondary site on Wednesday, within their current bubbles, for some transition work. We want to make sure our pupils have every opportunity to be ready for this transition time. Have an amazing weekend.

This week we have been thinking about being open minded and I know many pupils have been watching Steve's worship at home and school this week and have been making story wristbands.






## Maths with Miss Di Ricci - teacher Maths, Statistics & Finance

# THE CURIOUS INCIDENT OF THE DOG IN THE NIGHT-TIME

Christopher John Francis Boone knows all the countries of the world and their capitals and every prime number up to 7,057. He relates well to animals but has no understanding of human emotions. He cannot stand to be touched. And he detests the colour yellow.

Although gifted with a superbly logical brain, for fifteen-year-old Christopher everyday interactions and admonishments have little meaning. He lives on patterns, rules, and a diagram kept in his pocket. Then one day, a neighbour's dog, Wellington, is killed and Christopher's carefully constructed universe is threatened. He sets out to solve the murder in the style of his favourite (logical) detective, Sherlock Holmes. In doing so he unwittingly pieces together a jigsaw that reveals to the reader the lies, grief and evasions of his parents' lives.

"This will not be a funny book," says Christopher. "I cannot tell jokes because I do not understand them." But what follows *is* funny, poignant and fascinating in its portrayal of a person whose curse and blessing are a mind that perceives the world entirely literally.
